Three months later Jacklyn visited the head teacher of the Kibaale school and showed her feet to her - she had suffered with leprosy for many years.



but after receiving the soap, she had faith to believe that God would heal her if she washed her feet each day with the soap.

The soles of her feet were completely clean of leprosy, God had healed her feet. What rejoicing there was - A MIRACLE HAD TAKEN PLACE.

It reminded me of the mud Jesus placed on the eyes of the blind man, the mud could not heal the man's blindness, just as we know in the natural realm soap cannot heal leprosy. But a bar of soap mixed with an act of faith, and a belief that Jacklin had in God that He would heal her through the soap, and God brought heaven down to earth exploding in a divine healing.

Each time we act in faith to what God is saying to us there is the potential of a divine miracle. Praise God. What an encouragement this story is to us as individuals to increase our faith and belief in a mighty God who is still working miracles today.
